## Individual Responsibility #1: \_\_\_\_\_\_.

"Are any of you <u>suffering hardships</u>? <u>You should pray</u>. Are any of you happy? You should sing praises." (James 5:13)

*happy* or *merry* (KJV) = *euthymeo* is the same word \_\_\_\_\_\_uses in in Acts 27:22; "And now I exhort you to <u>be of good cheer</u>: for there shall be no loss of any man's life among you, but of the ship."

Paul acknowledges that no matter what situation we find ourselves in, we can be of good cheer–we can \_\_\_\_\_ God–because God is

"Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1 Thessalonians 5:18)

in = pos =

"Prayer is not preparation for the work of God. <u>Prayer is the work</u>." (Oswald Chambers)

There's nothing wrong with bringing our requests to God, but that's not the only thing we should do when we're experiencing affliction. Instead, we need to pray like \_\_\_\_\_.

"After saying all these things, Jesus looked up to heaven and said, 'Father, the hour has come. <u>Glorify your Son so he can give glory back to you</u>. For you have given him authority over everyone. He gives eternal life to each one you have given him. And this is the way to have eternal life–to know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, the one you sent to earth...'" (John 17:1-3)

## **JESUS' PRAYER IN JOHN 17**

- vs 1-5 He begins by focusing on the \_\_\_\_\_ of God.
- vs 6-19, Jesus prays about how his suffering will glorify God in the lives of those \_\_\_\_\_\_ to Him. Again, He's not concerned about Himself here, but about His disciples-how they will \_\_\_\_\_\_ to His suffering and how it will glorify God in their lives.

### Individual Responsibility #2:

"Are any of you sick? You should <u>call for the elders of the church to come</u> and pray over you, anointing you with oil in the name of the Lord. Such a prayer offered in faith will heal the sick, and the Lord will make you well" (James 5:14-15)

### sick = astheneo =

### elder = Episkope =

This refers to a person who holds a specific \_\_\_\_\_\_ within the church. This is where we get the English word \_\_\_\_\_.

### elder = presbyteros =

This generally refers to people within the church–usually those who are \_\_\_\_\_\_ in years–who are specifically recognized for their godly

Pray over = come \_\_\_\_\_. It means they unite their \_\_\_\_\_\_
with ours in prayer and \_\_\_\_\_\_ support.

Not only are they to come along side us, they're also to \_\_\_\_\_\_ us with oil. This was to be accompanied by the words "in the name of the Lord," which was an act of \_\_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_ in itself. When you're in the midst of affliction, who do you call on for help? Do you call on the elders for prayer and anointing or do you prefer to keep your suffering private?

# Corporate Responsibility #1: \_\_\_\_\_\_.

"Such a prayer offered in faith will heal the sick, and the Lord will make you well. And <u>if you have committed any sins</u>, you will be forgiven. <u>Confess your sins to each other and pray</u> for each other so that you may be <u>healed</u>." (James 5:15-16)

sick = Kakopatheo - doesn't just refer to \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ sickness, but \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, affliction, or \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ of any kind–and includes
everything from persecution, to bodily sickness, to sin or \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_
sickness.

It only makes sense that if the sickness is that broad, so is the healing–and includes everything from physical healing of disease to spiritual healing of committed \_\_\_\_\_.

Sin is a sickness and \_\_\_\_\_\_ is one of the keys to healing. However, scripture is clear that the only One who can forgive sins—the only One who can bring healing—is \_\_\_\_\_.

"If we confess our sins, <u>God is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins</u> and <u>cleanse us from all unrighteousness</u>." (1 John 1:9)

This kind of prayer raises up–it takes our eyes off \_\_\_\_\_\_ and places them firmly on God–the \_\_\_\_\_\_ of our forgiveness and healing. It leads to the forgiveness of sin; and restores \_\_\_\_\_\_ and fellowship in the body of Christ.

Corporate confession is about being \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ to each other and holding each other accountable. It's about being \_\_\_\_\_\_ with each other. If we see a brother or sister engaging in sin, we need to

them for the good of the community.

## How easy is it for you to confess your sins to some one else? How well do we hold each other accountable?

#### Corporate Responsibility #2. \_\_\_\_\_.

"Confess your sins to each other and <u>pray for each other so that you may</u> <u>be healed</u>. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and <u>produces wonderful results</u>. Elijah was as human as we are, and yet when he prayed earnestly that no rain would fall, none fell for three and a half years! Then, when he prayed again, the sky sent down rain and the earth began to yield its crops." (James 5:16-18)
