**“Stories of the Saviour ~ The Unforgiving Servant”**  
**Matthew 18:21-35**

Jesus’ parables had an element of \_\_\_\_\_ to them, however, this parable would have left His audience more \_\_\_\_\_ than any they’d heard so far.

Therefore, the Kingdom of Heaven can be compared to a king who decided to bring his accounts up to date with servants who had borrowed money from him.’” (Matthew 18:21-23)

**THE IMPORTANCE OF FORGIVENESS**

When we’re wronged or hurt, our natural inclination often comes in two extremes:

“‘You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?’ ...So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.” (Matthew 18:32-33)

Forgiveness isn’t something we can \_\_\_\_\_ for ourselves—God \_\_\_\_\_ gives it to us in Christ, so that we can \_\_\_\_\_ give it to others.

“If you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you refuse to forgive others, your Father will not forgive your sins.” (Matthew 6:14-15)

**TRUE FORGIVENESS INVOLVES . . .**

#1. \_\_\_\_\_ **how much I have been** \_\_\_\_\_.

“Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ, God forgave you.” (Ephesians 4:32)

The key here is \_\_\_\_\_. We are not forgiven because we \_\_\_\_\_ it or we’ve \_\_\_\_\_ it; we are not forgiven because we \_\_\_\_\_ never to sin again—we’re forgiven because we’ve put our \_\_\_\_\_ in Jesus.

“I tell you, her sins which were many, have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves, little.” ( Luke 7:47)

"Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." (Colossians 3:13)

"Dear friends, never avenge yourselves. Leave that to God. For it is written, 'I will take vengeance; I will repay those who deserve it,' says the Lord." (Romans 12:19)

"Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.'" (Matthew 18:21-22)

Jesus' point is, we forgive as often as it \_\_\_\_\_—until we're able to \_\_\_\_\_; until the desire for \_\_\_\_\_ is gone.

**Ten Reasons Why We Don't Forgive**

Jesus calls us to forgive as we have been forgiven. However, this is often easier said than done. The following are ten reasons that often keep us from forgiving. Can you relate to any of these? Have you ever struggled with any of these when it comes to forgiveness?

- Pride—forgiveness makes me look weak.
- I don't want to give up my excuse-making system (my coping mechanisms). When I don't forgive, I am in control. I remain able to manipulate others.
- I may get hurt again.
- If I ignore it, the problem will go away.
- Revenge—the other person has to pay for it. They need to learn a lesson.
- Failure to understand God's love and forgiveness for me.
- Failure to receive forgiveness myself—sometimes called "forgiving yourself." Before I can truly forgive others, I must forgive myself.
- It seems too easy and unfair. It seems I'm overlooking or condoning their sin.
- I am waiting for the person to come to me first.
- I am waiting for a "feeling."
