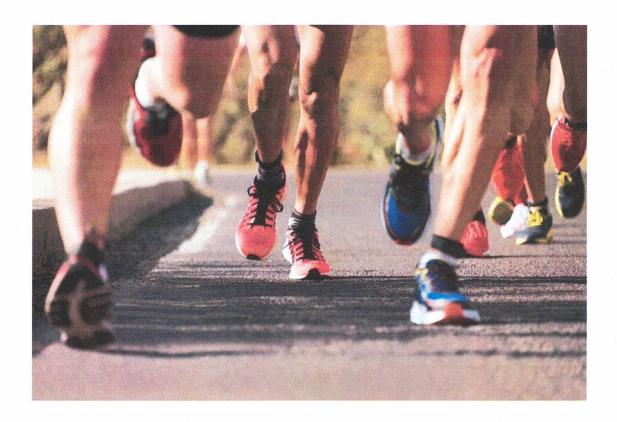

### Rector's Report to Vestry 2022

. . . but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus."

(Philippians 3:13-14)

As I write this report, we are in year two of a global pandemic that has had a profound impact on us as individuals and as a church community. Traditionally, the Rector's report to Vestry is an opportunity to reflect on, and give thanks for, the year that has passed, and to set out plans and priorities for the year ahead. However, once again, our ministry at Living Waters was limited in 2021 and sadly, there is not as much to report on as I would like.

Although COVID is guickly becoming the "new normal" and we are growing accustomed to living our lives against this backdrop, 2021 was still a difficult year on so many levels. Our regular pattern of corporate worship on Sunday mornings and our ministry and discipleship to each other and the community around us was constantly interrupted, and, at times, suspended all together. Of the 56 worship services held in 2021, 35 were in person and 21 were live streamed only, including Easter Sunday and Christmas Eve. If that wasn't hard enough, 2021 saw a greater polarization in our country, resulting in controversy and unrest over the COVID vaccine, vaccination policies and passports, and government mandates. With the arrival of the highly contagious Omicron variant, many of us know people who have personally been touched by COVID-19. If you didn't contract the disease, like Kathy and I did over Christmas; you were likely touched by at least one of its many side effects, such as the loss of employment, loneliness, and mental health issues. However, as I've said to you many times since this pandemic began, in the midst of all of the uncertainty and fear, one thought continues to bring me comfort: God wasn't surprised or taken aback by the events of 2021, and no matter how difficult things have been or how difficult they get, our lives rest securely in His hands! We can be confident that no matter what happens in the days ahead, the Lamb is on the throne, and we can have hope even in our darkest moments.

Although it felt like everything in 2021 was working against us, there is so much that we can be thankful for. We can give thanks to God for His ongoing faithfulness to us and our church over the past twelve months. We can give thanks for the times were able to worship in person and for the technology to allow us to be together virtually when in person gatherings were not possible. We can give thanks that the gospel continued to proclaimed at Living Waters, as the focus of our shared life together. We can give thanks for the many ways that each of you persevered and continued to reflect the gospel, often at great cost, raising children and grandchildren, supporting parents, neighbours, or adult children. We can give thanks for the ongoing ministry and witness of the Anglican Network in Canada across this country, and for the election of our new Co-Adjutor Bishop, The Rt. Rev. Dan Gifford. Clearly, we shouldn't let the negative aspects of this season distract us from the many blessings!

Although we have no idea what 2022 will bring, and whether or not we will see the end of this pandemic and all of the restrictions that have hindered our worship and ministry, the above words from the Apostle Paul's letter to the Philippians provide us with some good advice. In this passage, the Apostle Paul is laser-focussed on the race, the goal, and the finish line of his journey of faith. Like an olympian runner, he doesn't turn back to dwell on the past. Instead, forgetting what is

behind, he looks forward resolutely toward the final victory lap when he will see the Lord Jesus face to face. We shouldn't forget that even though Paul is responsible for writing much of the New Testament, as Saul, he was a violent persecutor of the church, playing a part in the stoning of the first Christian martyr, Stephen. Paul could have let guilt and shame cripple him for that, however, he forgot what was in the past. He didn't let it haunt him or trip him up in the present. Neither did he dwell on his sufferings, beatings, shipwrecks, and imprisonment. He forgot the disappointments and challenges of rebellious church members, false teachers, and persecutions. Instead, he trained his eyes on a vision of his Master waiting for him at the finish line.

Although Christians are called to be like Christ, we continue to make mistakes. Like Paul, we haven't "arrived" yet. As we run the race of faith, we stumble and fall, we get side tracked, take wrong turns, and encounter many different kinds of roadblocks. In fact, we'll never obtain complete sanctification until we stand before the Lord. However, God uses our imperfections to help us "grow up" in faith. We all have a common problem that we struggle with called "the flesh," that pulls us toward sin and away from the prize of the upward call. Thankfully, our flesh also keeps us painfully aware of our need to diligently press on toward the goal. For this reason, Paul exerted an all-out. single-minded effort to keep looking forward and pressing on to obtain Christian maturity. Paul also calls the Philippians, and us, to diligently strive with every spiritual muscle to pursue forward momentum in our Christian lives. The author of the Book of Hebrews echoes Paul's words with this similar encouragement in Hebrews 12:1-2: "Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith." God alone is the source of our salvation as well as the supplier of our spiritual growth. The closer we get to completing the race, the more we realize how much further we have to go to become like Christ. However, we cannot look back. If we do, we'll get burdened down under the weight of the past.

As we continue to journey through, and eventually come out of, this pandemic, we need to do so looking forward and pressing on. We need to fix our eyes on the prize—on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. We need to seek His will for us and for Living Waters, and how He would have us move forward as a congregation. Even before COVID began, I felt like we were often spinning our wheels instead of moving forward. One of the reasons for this is we don't have our own building, not just as a place to worship, but as a ministry centre, through which we reach out to the wider community. Not having our own space makes it easier to focus our fellowship on Sunday morning only, and as you know, the ministry of the church is about so much more than just what we do on Sunday morning. To address this, I hope to have an open discussion at our Vestry meeting this year about how we can move forward and press on in this area. Following the Lord's leading, I hope to strike a Building Task Force to begin to pray about and explore this issue and to create a long-term plan that can help guide us as we move forward in God's will for us.

Having said that, any prize we might seek and obtain here on earth will not last. Only what is eternal will last forever. Paul told the believers in Corinth that he was working for "a crown that will last forever." To win the eternal crown, we need to exercise self-discipline. Again, Paul uses the imagery of a runner in a race: "Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize." (1 Cor 9:24–27)

Let us be encouraged by Paul's emphasis here on forgetting the past—what is behind—and straining forward to what lies ahead. Not letting yesterday's failures distract us from the goal of the upward call of God in Christ. Not letting the challenges of the past two years keep us from running the race that God has set before us as individuals and as a community of faith. Let us press on together for the gold medal prize until we meet the Lord Jesus at the finish line!

I am very grateful to all of you who have helped the body of Christ at Living Water's and beyond in so many ways this past year. I am also thankful for the dedicated work of our Parish Council and Executive: Yolande Chan, Ross Underhill, Kathleen Young, and John Telgmann; for Simon Teague, our intern; those who helped with screening protocols and Sunday morning worship when we were able to meet in person; our worship team; Life Group leaders; our Missions Committee; and all those who have given their time and talents to the work and ministry of Living Waters over the past year. I would also like to thank the members of the congregation and our other supporters for their faithful stewardship and generous giving to the work of God in and through Living Waters these past 12 months. Because of your tithes and offerings, and reduced spending due to COVID-19, we were more than able to meet our ministry and financial obligations for 2021. In addition, we were also able to give 7.5% of our 2021 Operating Budget to our mission partners through the work of our Missions Committee and 10% to the work and ministry of our Diocese. Praise God!

It has been a real gift for me to live out my ministry among so many faithful and committed people and to share in the work of the Kingdom with you this past year. I am confident that God will continue to bless us in our mission and ministry in 2022, as we look forward and press on in the work He has for us.

### Financial Reports 2020 Year-End Financial Statements

John Telgmann, the treasurer presented to the meeting the financial statements of the Church for the financial year ended December 31, 2020 (with comparative figures for 2019). A copy of the financial statements was available to each member in advance of the meeting.

### Highlights:

- Revenues were down, but as a result of the Pandemic we paid far less rent (and other expenses) than we would have in a typical year.
- We finished the year with a surplus.
- We received additional revenue from the Canada Emergency wage subsidy.

Special Resolution re: Review Engagement for 2021

Yolande Chan, the rector's warden reminded the members that under the Canadian Not-for-Profit Corporations Act a soliciting corporation like Living Waters with gross annual revenues more than \$50,000 and up to \$250,000 must engage a licensed public accountant to conduct an audit, but with consent, given annually, of all the members of the Corporation voting at an annual meeting may dispense with the requirement of appointing an auditor, and members can pass a special resolution, by 2/3 majority, to require a review engagement instead. The cost of an audit would be up to five times as costly as a review engagement.

John Telgmann, the treasurer presented to the meeting the Operating Fund Budget of the Corporation for the financial year 2021 (with comparative figures for 2017, 2018, 2019, and 2020). A copy of the 2021 Operating Fund Budget was provided to each member in advance of the meeting.

### Highlights:

- We will do a more formal forecast in September of 2021 as the situation may change greatly as a result of the ongoing Pandemic.
- Conservative budget as we are still in the midst of recovering from the Pandemic.
- We are presenting a deficit budget as we have balances to cover in the case where it is required, and the actual situation is rapidly evolving. It is difficult to predict how the financial situation will be impacted by the evolving pandemic situation.

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Living Waters Anglican Fellowship Kingston Accountant's Report for the year ended December 31, 2021 (unaudited)

To the Members of Living Waters Anglican Fellowship Kingston:

With the Covid-19 pandemic continuing in 2021 the financial picture was similar to 2020. Please see following the formal fund accounting financial statements in accordance with Canadian Accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

### Highlights:

- Contributions from parishioners and a few visitors to the Operating Fund in 2021 at \$155,267 were 1% more than 2020 at \$154,167. For perspective 2020, the first year of the effect of Covid-19 saw a drop of \$9,135 or 6% from 2019 levels.
- 2 Methods of Giving to the Operating Fund:

- 3 Expenses in 2021 at \$150,832 in 2021 where almost the same as 2020 at \$151,265. As was the case in 2020 in person worship was shut down at times due to Covid-19. Fortunately, the Senior's Centre does not charge when not using the gymnasium. Rent cost \$7,320 in 2021 and \$15,166 in 2019.
- 4 Primarily due to the low rent there is an Operating Fund surplus of \$4,435 for 2021 (i.e., total revenues of \$155,267 less expenditures of \$150,832). If you deduct the Transfer of \$520 from the General Fund to the Capital Asset Fund for the purchase of a printer the surplus is \$3,915.
- 5 So, the Operating Fund has a December 31, 2021 cumulative balance of \$20,261 (i.e., beginning balance of \$16,346 + surplus of \$4,4435 \$520 transfers)
- The Capital Asset Fund balance of \$18,371 is composed of cash \$1,194 and investments (i.e, marketable securities) valued at \$17,177 which earned 17% vs say a guaranteed investment certificates (GICs) of less that 1%. Not every year in the market will be like 2021!
- 7 Combining all the separate accounting Funds there is \$33,287 of cash plus \$17,177 of investments at the end of the year.
- See Schedule 3 for the list of mission partner organizations / missionaries and the amounts allocated to them in 2021 amounting to \$11,480 and in 2020 \$11,687.

### **Notes to Financial Statements**

For the year ended December 31, 2021 (unaudited)

### 1. Incorporation and nature of the organization

Living Waters Anglican Fellowship Kingston (the "Church") was incorporated on September 3, 2015 under the Not-For-Profit Corporations Act of Canada, and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act.

The purpose of the Church is as a community of faith to praise God, to follow Jesus Christ, make disciples, and share the gospel faithfully to the nations.

### 2. Significant accounting policies

### (a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations set out in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook - Accounting, as issued by the Accounting Standards Board in Canada, which are part of Canadian generally accepted accounting principles and include the following significant accounting policies:

### (b) Fund accounting

The Church follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Amounts received or expended by the Church on behalf of specific funds have been separated and are reported in the statement of the applicable fund.

The *General Fund* accounts for the Church's program delivery and administrative activities. This fund reports all unrestricted expendable resources.

The Capital Asset Fund accounts for tangible capital assets (now unexpendable) of the Church and amortization thereon. In current year, these funds were reclassified from restricted to unrestricted.

The Internally Restricted Capital (Building) Fund accounts for the internally restricted expendable assets and investment income.

The Externally Restricted Capital (Building) Fund accounts for the externally restricted expendable assets, and investment income, and expenses related to funding the purchase of a building for the Church.

The Special Purpose Restricted Fund reports various restricted funds that have been set up for various purposes outside the scope of other funds. Currently, there is a Youth Event Fund, the Grace Fund (a benevolent fund at the discretion of the Rector), Special Missions Fund, and Memorial Fund to the end of 2020.

### 2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

### (c) Revenue recognition

Externally restricted contributions can only be used for purposes designated by the donor and are recognized as revenue of the appropriate restricted fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the General Fund when received or receivable on an accrual basis.

Investment income is recognized as revenue of the Capital & Building Funds on a prorated basis when earned, and on an accrual basis.

Program revenue (e.g. retreat, dinner, book costs recovered) are recognized as revenue of the General Fund when the various programs are held.

### (d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include balances with banks and short-term investments with maturities of three months or less. Cash subject to purpose or time restrictions are included in restricted cash.

### (e) Investments

Investments are initially recorded at their acquisition cost, including related transaction costs, on the date of the trade. Investments are subsequently adjusted to fair market value as at the year end date, and the corresponding unrealized gains and losses are recorded in investment income.

### (f) Tangible capital assets and amortization

Purchased tangible assets greater than or equal to \$500 are recorded as an asset at cost. If the cost of tangible assets are less than \$500 they are recorded as an operating expenditure (small tools & equipment). Contributed (in-kind) capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution plus all costs directly attributable to the acquisition.

Amortization is provided using methods and rates intended to amortize the cost of tangible assets over their estimated useful lives. Amortization is recorded in the Unrestricted Capital Asset Fund. The amortization rate is as follows:

### (g) Contributed services

Volunteers assist the Church in carrying out its ministry. Because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements. Contributed goods or gifts-in-kind are only recognized when their fair value is reasonably determinable and significant, with such items recorded at fair value on the date of the contribution (for example, shares of publicly traded companies). During the years 2021 and 2020 the Church did not receive any material gifts in-kind.

### (h) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations requires the coordinating council to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Estimates have been made by the coordinating council within these financial statements primarily in relation to capitalization and amortization of tangible capital assets, and accrued liabilities.

### (i) Taxes

The Church is exempt from paying income taxes, as it is a registered charitable organization. The Church initially pays GST/HST on purchases but receives back a portion (after filing the rebate return) entitled by charitable organizations.

The Church, as an employer, pays payroll taxes including Canada Pension Plan and Employment Insurance.

### 15. Transfers between funds

### 16. Financial instruments

The Church, as part of its investing activities, carries equity risk associated with the valuation of marketable securities (see Note 6) arising from changes in equity markets but is not exposed to significant currency, credit, liquidity risks arising from these financial instruments.

### 17. Defined contribution pension plan

The Church is a member of the Anglican Network in Canada Group Retirement Program (the "Plan") managed by Standard Life. It is a defined contribution plan and all employees are eligible to participate in the Plan. At this point the rector is participating. The Church contributes 10% of the rector's gross salary to the Plan. The agreement is such that the Church is not responsible for any shortfalls or market performance of the Plan. Therefore no liability is recorded in the Statement of Financial Position (page 1). Employees can contribute the maximum percentage allowed by law of their eligible salary to the Plan. All Church contributions to the Plan are immediately vested by the employee. Contributions by the Church for the year 2021 amounted to \$7,870 (2020 - 7,7745) and are included in expenses on the statement of operations.

### 18. Subsequent events

The coronavirus disease (Covid-19) continues to have a considerable impact on the operating environment, both globally and locally, which has the potential to create financial stress on the Church due to economic uncertainty affecting actual and potential donors and thus the receipts of donations may continue to be reduced.

### 19. Comparative figures

Certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation.
