"For the <u>love of money is the root of all kinds of evil</u> . And some people, craving money, have <u>wandered from the true faith and pierced themselves with many sorrows</u> ." (1 Timothy 6:10)
Money is a to be used for God's in our life and it is also our character, our, and our priorities, and even our faith.
"There was a certain rich man who had a manager handling his affairs. One day a report came that the manager was wasting his employer's money. So the employer called him in and said, 'What's this I hear about you? Get your report in order, because you are going to be fired." (Luke 16:1-2)
Jesus isn't telling us we should be, but rather, like the manager, we should be shrewd of everything that God's given us.
"If you are <u>faithful</u> in little things, you will be faithful in large ones. But if you are dishonest in little things, you won't be honest with greater responsibilities. And if you are untrustworthy about worldly wealth, who will trust you with the true riches of heaven?" (Luke 16:10-11)
PRACTISING FAITHFUL STEWARDSHIP
