However, this morning, John takes us behind the scenes. He lifts us from the stable and places us in the heavens. He pulls back the veil and shows us thereality of who this Child truly is.

3 IMPORTANT POINTS		
Point #1: The Light is "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God." (John 1:1-2)		
"In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth." (Genesis 1:1)		
John intentionally reaches back to creation to make an earth-shaking point: Before creation, before time, before Bethlehem, the Word already Jesus doesn't begin in a manger. He doesn't begin with Mary. He doesn't begin with angelic announcements or shepherds hurrying through the night. He's He's divine. He's uncreated. He's Himself.		
"He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is <u>before all things</u> , and in him all things hold together." (Colossians 1:15-17)
